PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In my time at the Hobart Cat Centre I have seen the organisation evolve and progress, and with this report we will be entering a new exciting stage of the organisation's history.

The Cat Centre evolved from a love of animals, and in particular cats. My research reveals that Joan Allport commenced and was President of the Tasmanian **Animal Protection Society** (TAPS) between 1949 and 1979. Although there is little documented, it appears that over those years Joan Allport together with Florence Robson cared for animals at private residences. TAPS is recorded as officially being incorporated in 1971, and sometime after that it became a dedicated Cat Centre at 67A Strickland Avenue, South Hobart. I can recall boarding my tabby cat Eric at this Centre in the early 1990's. I hear there were a lot of difficult times, but through the hard work

of dedicated volunteers the Centre continued to grow. The current incatnation of our Op Shop was established in 1996 in Blackmans Bay by the longserving President Mona Foster and Treasurer Alan Cunningham, and then later relocated to its current premises in Margate. The Op Shop proved essential in providing the necessary funding to maintain and grow the Centre, and has continued to be successful under Robin Tacey's stewardship. The Centre entered a new period under the President Ingrid Tebb. Following its name change in 2004 to the "Hobart Cat Centre" it moved to the premises at Selfs Point in October 2007, where it remains today. This represented a new professionalism to the Centre with a separate dedicated premises. In 2015, there was a change to the Board, and a new Strategic Plan was developed. Although the operations of the Centre have changed in many ways, one thing is clear to the current Board: we need to maintain Florence Robson's

vision of providing a shelter for unwanted cats and kittens, and to advocate responsible pet ownership and education. (There are many other names which I could have and should have mentioned here, but we are in the process of compiling a full history to enable us to include everyone.)

In comparison to the early days, the issue of responsible animal care and ownership has now become a major public issue. In 1949 there was no law regulating cat owners' responsibilities, while now we have the Cat Management Act. I believe cats were rarely mentioned then in public debate, but it is hard to pick up a newspaper now and not find an article or letter about someone's opinion on cats. We consider this to be a great development, and as advocates for responsible ownership, it is important that policy is grounded on evidence and not emotion-based opinion. For this reason, we are involved

in several government and community reference groups, and are pursuing strategic projects with the aim of better educating ourselves and the community on the care of cats. One of the major projects we have undertaken is to establish an in-house veterinary surgery, where we can ensure cats have immediate first class care, and our staff learn from working with the vets. My own experience with the vets taught me that my foster cat was not critically ill and did not have a personality problem, but the problem lay with me in not giving her enough time to become comfortable in her new surroundings!

We have also become partners, and entered Memorandums of Understanding with, several external organisations as part of various cat research projects, including the Cat Management Project on Bruny Island and a research project with the University of South Australia on cat roaming. It will be very interesting to see

how much our beloved friends roam of an evening. Further, we have created a dedicated Community and Education Manager position, and will play a ground-breaking role in grassroots responsible cat ownership education in schools with the Edu.Cat program.

With all these new developments and as we continue to take the lead in all thing cats, it is important that the Cat Centre is not seen as simply just a refuge for unwanted cats and kittens. We consider that the time is right for a new name to better reflect our position in the community. With our long history and the hard work of people before us who laid the foundations for such a successful organisation, we believe that the Centre is well positioned to be the leader in cat management and education in Tasmania and indeed Australia, with a new name and brand that reflects cats, the environment and the community.

We are fortunate that between the Board, staff and volunteers. the Centre has a talent pool which would be the envy of many other organisations, in any sector. This has meant that almost all of the work involved in the rebranding of the Centre has been done in-house at minimal cost, with a very professional result. Special thanks must go to our talented Marketing and Communications Manager Joel Diprose, our Centre Manager Noel Hunt and my fellow Board members, in particular our Board member Prue Horne.

As we embark on this new chapter we are very conscious not to forget our humble origins and our history. As an organisation that receives no formal government funding, we are solely reliant on the good will of the community through their donations and the hardworking volunteers to maintain our operations. Although change can take time to adjust to, I encourage everyone to embrace the new direction, and fully support the Centre in any way possible to be the leader in the care of cats in the community. With your support the Centre will continue to thrive.

The Centre has a proud history of more than 70 years of caring for cats, and we feel that Ten Lives reflects the very exciting future direction of the Centre for the next decades. As the old English proverb says, "A cat has nine lives. For three he plays, for three he strays and for the last three he stays." We believe that when a cat comes to us, we give him one extra life, so he in fact has Ten Lives.

Welcome to Ten Lives: caring for cats, the environment and the community.

When kitten season finishes in the next couple of months we will be seeking your feedback through a survey so that we can continue to improve our support for you. We know that you have gone over and above the call of duty often as we have dealt with a large number of kittens and cats this year. We really appreciate how you have just stepped up to the mark and helped us get through this challenge. One of our foster carers said to me recently that she didn't mind putting in the hard yards because she found it so rewarding. She went on to say that being a foster carer she felt like she was part of a big family at the Centre doing really worthwhile work. I think she is right.

Our trusty van has been traded in on a new vehicle. Now that we have our own in-house vet team we aren't transporting kitties backwards and forwards to external vets as much as used to. Our Education and Community Manager, Rose Bray, does need to get around the schools delivering our innovative responsible cat ownership program Edu.Cat. We needed a more suitable vehicle and something safer to drive; unloaded vans are a little slippery in wet conditions. The Jackson Motor Company in Derwent Park did us a great deal that made this a very inexpensive changeover. Thanks guys!

I am easily amused so I always referred to our Toyota van as the Cat Detector Van, a reference from an old Monty Python skit.

Our new vehicle sporting our new Ten Lives livery with Chester on one side and Winkie on the other, for me will always be ...the Winkie Mobile.

The year ahead

The Cat Management project on Bruny Island will get into full swing this year and we will get valuable science and data to help inform better cat welfare and management on a broader scale across Tasmania. We will be working with the University of South Australia on a cat tracking project to get insightful data on cat activities when they are out roaming. This should be underway in July.

We will have other projects starting during the year so we are expecting a busy time caring for our cats and kittens and working improving the way our community care for them as well.

REBRANDING

Why have we changed our name?

The Centre has a proud history of more than 70 years of caring for the unwanted cats and kittens of southern Tasmania. We recognise and honour the extraordinary contribution of the pioneers of animal and cat welfare, Joan Allport and Florence Robson, as well as Mona Foster, Ingrid Tebb and all the past Presidents, Managers, staff and volunteers who have made the Centre such a special place over the past four decades.

Building on this legacy, and thanks to the efforts of the Board and Centre Manager in developing and implementing the Strategic Plan over the past two years, in 2017 we are now more than just a cat rescue centre in Hobart:

- we care for the cats and kittens of southern Tasmania
- we have an in-house veterinary surgery to provide immediate, first-class care for cats
- we are educating the community on responsible cat ownership and cat welfare through our Community and Education Manager
- we will play a ground-breaking, grass roots role in responsible cat ownership across Tasmania through the school-based Edu.Cat Program from Kindergarten to Year 7
- we are taking a leading role in cat management through involvement in community reference groups and partnerships with organisations such as Councils, DPIPWE, Tasmanian Conservation Trust, UTAS, University of South Australia and Tasmanian Land Conservancy.

The new name "Ten Lives Cat Centre" better reflects who we are, what we do and where we do it: for cats, the environment and the community in Tasmania. "Ten Lives" gives us a voice on a state, national and even international level as a leading cat management organisation.

Ten Lives is a play on the old English proverb that claims, "A cat has nine lives. For three he plays, for three he strays and for the last three he stays."

We believe that when a cat comes to us, we give him one extra life, so in fact he has Ten Lives.














Teachers, take the Edu.Cat challenge!

Did you know hundreds of unwanted cats and kittens are surrendered to shelters across Tasmania every week?

The Ten Lives Cat Centre knows there is a better way to deal with the cat crisis in our communities. Let's explore, engage and educate young people and their families on ways to reduce the number of unwanted cats and kittens, via **Edu.Cat**.

People. Planet. Pussy Cats.

Edu.Cat aims to increase public awareness and understanding of the complex issues surrounding cats and the environment, feline welfare and the community. Ten Lives Cat Centre are the leaders for all things cats, supporting the community in feline welfare since 1974.

Take the STEM Challenge

The **Edu.Cat** program is grounded in STEM Challenges (Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths). The education program is designed by experts in feline welfare and education and includes:

- alignment to the Australian Curriculum for years F-7
- hands-on, real life, team challenges affecting students' daily lives
- links to STEM assessment outcomes
- incursion to ignite engagement with live cats and kittens
- three easy to follow classroom activity plans with student workbooks
- teacher handbooks, online resources, posters and more.

Teachers:

Edu.Cat is a STEM Challenge easily completed in 2 hours at the Foundation level, and in 4.5 hours in year 7. This includes a free 45-60 minute incursion by a cat education expert who has developed an engaging, handson session tailored to your year level.

Edu.Cat is designed to empower students to enquire, think, investigate and innovate. STEM Challenges engage students in teams in a real-life community issue, providing opportunity for skill building in:

problem-solving

- innovative thinking
- communications
- productive teamwork
- generating multiple ideas
- · decision-making.

Each **Edu.Cat** challenge works towards a design outcome with student assessment criteria. Students are asked big questions such as:

- What impacts do feral and pet cats have on wildlife in Tasmanian and Australia?
- What do pet cats need to survive? What do they need to be happy?
- Why does containing cats help cats, our community and wildlife? What do pet cats need to stimulate their mind and body when contained?

An example from the year **5/6 Edu.Cat Challenge** is, "In teams, students design and construct a cat toy from recycled materials which is suited to their hunting adaptations, to keep cats happy inside or in an enclosure."

The Ten Lives Cat Centre's **Edu.Cat** program is a ground-breaking education program free to all schools in Tasmania starting Term 2, 2017.

HOW YOU CAN HELP



The Ten Lives Cat Centre is a self-funded not-for-profit cat welfare organisation. We do not receive government funding, and we rely on funds generated from our own operations and the support of the general community.

As we move into our fifth decade of operation, it is heartening to note that our support base is evergrowing and that the community as a whole is working together to improve the lives of animals in general across the state.

How can I help?

You can help the Centre through donations.

We need old newspapers, woollen blankets, jumpers and towels which ensure our kitties stay warm, especially during our chilly Hobart winters.

We need practical items like copy paper, toilet tissue, dish liquid, washing powder, hand wash, paper towels, garbage bags and stationery products, which aren't very exciting but are extremely necessary in the running of the Centre.

We need financial donations to provide ongoing care for cats and kittens as well as the maintenance of our facilities. Donations of over \$2 are tax-deductible and donations can be made via our website, over the phone or in person at the Centre.

\$2 per month	will help provide toys and activities for our cats during their stay with us
\$10 per month	can provide treatment for common ailments such as digestive upset, fleas and mites
\$15 per month	desex, microchip and vaccinate a kitten ready for it to find its forever home
\$20 per month	sponsor a cat which contributes to the cats stay with us until we find the cat a home
\$50 per month	would support a litter of kittens that require foster care before being adopted



We say that every cat has a story, and this is one of the more amazing ones we've told!

A wildlife carer received a very unusual call for help from a cat owner. Their desexed cat had brought home five two week old kittens from a house two hundred metres away.

The kittens' biological mother had moved house with its owner two days prior. The kittens who were left behind would have died had it not been for this overly maternal cat who rescued them.

The kittens were brought to the Hobart Cat Centre on January the 20th where they were toileted, fed and placed in the loving care of one of our experienced foster carers, Vikki.

Chili, Pepper, Cinnamon, Nutmeg and Rosemary - or the 'Spice Kittens' as they became known - remained in foster care until March the 24th, when they were old enough to be desexed, microchipped, vaccinated and got the ok from our vet team to become available for adoption.

My motto is...


