Building Project Update

It seems you can occasionally get a googly bowled at you, not only in cricket, in a building project too!

Ten Lives is located on what was an old rubbish tip site back in the 1960's. This raised engineering concerns about load bearing capability of the ground for our new buildings. This has required us to go back to get some more drilling and measuring completed.

It was looking like additional costs for the project with initial

indications that this could be \$100k plus! Our builder Podmatrix and the engineers have arrived at solution costing around \$25k. We were encouraged that this would mean we could keep going with the project. But we were thrilled and thankful when Zack and Mitch from Podmatrix said, 'don't worry, we will donate the work materials involved, to help you out'.

To top off this good news, Podmatrix have agreed to make a donation via a further discount bringing the price of the project back to pre-pandemic levels. Zack and Mitch and the team at Podmatrix, thank you... just thank you.

The delays due to the pandemic have been frustrating and it has made it challenging for us to go about our work saving and caring for unwanted cats and kittens. But our team of volunteers, foster carers and staff are buoyed by the generous support that we are receiving, and they continue to deliver exceptional care to our



Special Visitors See Ten Lives' Unique Animal-Assisted Therapy Program

We had very special visitors to the Centre in September when we welcomed our Patron, The Governor, Her Excellency the Honourable Barbara Baker AC and her husband Emeritus Professor Don Chalmers. President David Rees hosted the visit, and Her Excellency and Professor Chalmers were very interested in our work for cats, the environment and community, particularly the Happy Paws Happy Hearts Program.

Rhianna Peters, Program Trainer for Happy Paws Happy Hearts, said the participants of the program were very excited about the visit and were very keen to meet Her Excellency and Professor Chalmers.

Rhianna spoke with our guests

and explained what Happy Paws Happy Hearts is all about.

Rhianna explained that Happy Paws Happy Hearts is a spin on traditional animal therapy for participants with various abilities and support needs. Participants who are part of the NDIS, SLES, other disability services, or self-funded can join small group sessions centred around animal interactions, where they spend time with the cats and kittens at Ten Lives.

Initially, participants learn animal behaviour basics through fun and engaging activities. They explore new aspects of the Animal Care Industry, including training, health and nutrition, enrichment, and grooming - with plenty of time for kitten cuddles! Rhianna summarised the outcomes of the program for the participants (the Hearts) and Ten Lives' cats and kittens (the Paws):

Outcomes for the Hearts:

- Increased confidence through positive training and skills attainment.
- Increased social connections and support network.
- Increased sense of purpose and engagement with family/ friends.
- Better employment prospects.
- Improvements in mental health and wellbeing.

Outcomes for the Paws:

- Socialisation time and opportunities to rebuild trust in humans.
- Increased adoptable behaviours on display to prospective families.
- A happy and healthy living environment.

Happy Paws Happy Hearts has been available at Ten Lives since January this year and has been a runaway success for both the Hearts and the Paws.

Her Excellency and Professor Chalmers' visit included a comprehensive tour of all of the facilities for cats and kittens at the Centre at Selfs Point. This included existing facilities such as our hospital and vet surgery along with a look at the welfare areas where the public, staff, volunteers and foster carers interact and work together for the cats and kittens in our care. The new building works by Podmatrix and the work through Tradies for Tabbies was also a highlight.

The works of the Southern Region Cat Management Coordinator, Dr Sara Balouch, was presented covering her efforts promoting responsible cat ownership in the community and working with local government to action the Southern Region Cat Management Plan. We also showcased Edu.Cat, our education program for schools, which post pandemic is starting to get back into schools.

Many of our volunteers and staff were delighted to meet our guests during the tour, and of course our cats and kittens!

There was a lot to fit in on this visit and we were proud to welcome our Patron and Governor, and Professor Chalmers to showcase our work for animal welfare, the community and the environment. We look forward to the next visit!













FOSTERING: A FAMILY AFFAIR

John Wright along with his wife Susan and their family have fostered 54 cats and kittens for Ten Lives since March 2021.

"My wife Susan went to do the training and I was sitting at the kitchen table eating lunch when she came home. And I said, 'How did the training go?' and she's like 'Well...' and she had a mum with five kittens in a crate!" John said. "Everyone [at Ten Lives] has been absolutely terrific and they make it so easy to do the fostering because the communication is so good."

Fostering has become a family affair for the Wright's.

"My kids absolutely love it because they get to be introduced to new cats all the time. And it's not just my wife and I doing all the care. They help out heaps with it, so you have like the rewarding side of things." John said.

You get a different experience with every cat or kitten you foster, and Ten Lives will match kitties needing foster to suit your home environment whether it be children or other pets. "Each of the cats that we've had have changed our home in a different way and there's been many times where I've come in to the Centre to return a foster cat and left in tears because I really wanted to keep them." John said. "So it's not always that easy but we always know that they go to a good home."

And on getting an update about how their foster kitty is going in their forever home: "There's been a couple of cats now that I've commented on their profiles on Facebook and the new owners or in one case, the new owner's daughter has got in contact with me to give me updates on how the cat's gone and just the joy that brings is amazing."

Ten Lives is encouraging families to become involved in foster caring over the summer holiday period when we see an influx of cats and kittens requiring foster care.



Triumph Through Trials: Kristopher's Story









Meet Kristopher, an extraordinary feline who has met several unique medical challenges with grace and patience. Despite these hurdles, he gives unconditional love, joy and affection to everyone he meets. Kristopher's nature highlights his courage in facing life's trials and discovering the silver linings.

Kristopher's journey at Ten Lives started with a surprising discovery: early cataracts in both of his eyes at a young age. While cataracts often lead to vision problems, Kristopher's cataracts are small and undeveloped, with no current impact on his vision. The cause remains a mystery, and it's uncertain if they will progress. While veterinary checkups are advised, Kristopher currently leads a full and active life with no vision-related issues.



In addition to his cataracts, Kristopher was diagnosed with a class 2 malocclusion - a slight overbite. His lower canines were removed to prevent future complications, and his mouth has healed well. Despite the overbite, Kristopher eats and grooms normally, without allowing it to negatively impact his life.

On top of that, Kristopher was found to have a low-grade heart murmur, assessed as mild and currently asymptomatic. As with his cataracts, regular monitoring is recommended, but this hasn't dampened his zest for life. His heart is full of love, ready to share with his forever family.

The final medical challenge during Kristopher's journey was a difficult case of ear mites.



Throughout the duration of his treatment, Kristopher showed great resilience and a friendly disposition.

From his shelter arrival on April 5th to adoption on August 10th, Kristopher consistently displayed his joyful nature. Foster carers praised his energy, playfulness, and his ability to get along with other cats.

Kristopher's story is a reminder that a positive outlook and a loving heart can conquer any challenge. Despite all of these medical conditions, his spirit remains unbroken. His journey underscores the strength found in unexpected places and reminds us that every cat, regardless of circumstances, deserves a loving forever home.

How working with cats at HPHH increased Emma's confidence

"Every Wednesday morning, I get excited, coming to [Ten Lives] and doing something I enjoy. I just love it."

Emma was one of the first participants at Happy Paws Happy Hearts (HPHH) in Hobart, located at Ten Lives Cat Centre. She saw an ad on Facebook just after Christmas and knew she wanted to join the crew because she loves cats and likes learning new things.

Emma has worked as a carer for eight years, and in her spare time, she loves to garden and spoil her cat named Grace. Her favourite animals are zebras and cats.

In her time at HPHH, she estimates she has worked with over 30 cats. She loves meeting all the different cats and kittens, learning about their personalities and spending time with them.

Her most memorable experience so far with us was working with Jemima – a beautiful cat that the HPHH team worked with for a couple of months – and how she came out of her shell over time.

"She went from not coming out of her little igloo to coming out and loving pats and being a completely different cat after that interaction with people," Emma says.

"Then she got adopted, which was the best thing ever."

Emma is proud that she could crate-train her cat Grace after learning to do this at HPHH. Grace didn't like her crate. Following the crate training instructions she learned at HPHH, Emma got Grace into her crate after about a week of patience and lots of treats.

"We went to the vet last Friday, and she did not make one noise the whole way in and the whole way home," Emma says.

"[Before this], she would not go near the crate if she saw it; she'd run away. So that's something I'm quite proud of, and I'm proud of my girl [Grace]."

Since joining HPHH, Emma says she has gained a lot of confidence.

"I feel a lot more confident within myself," she says. Senior Program Trainer at Happy Paws Happy Hearts, Rhianna Peters, says another thing that sticks out to her is how calm Emma is with the cats.

"When you're in with the cats, you're calm, and they just gravitate towards you. They're really relaxed, even the nervous ones that are a bit scared and they might be hiding," Rhianna says.

"You're so gentle in your approach and calm, and they come out of their shell so quickly with you."

Emma says it makes her excited to come to HPHH and she looks forward to it each week. She would recommend it to anyone who loves cats.

"I'm so happy [HPHH] finally started down in Tassie. Thank you for running this program and I've got a lot out of it," she says.



Midway Point Project Update

Building on the success of our collaborative initiative, TassieCat, Ten Lives, and Sorell Council are making significant steps in cat management at Midway Point.

Our primary goal is to gather comprehensive data from the local community to promote responsible cat ownership. Through an online survey, we received an impressive response of nearly 300 participants, providing invaluable insights into various aspects of cat ownership and management. Joel Diprose (Ten Lives) is currently working on an informative infographic to visually present the survey findings. These results will not only be shared with our project's key stakeholders but will also be disseminated across various media platforms for wider outreach.

In our dedication to fostering community engagement, we recently conducted an engaging workshop at Sorell School as part of our Edu.Cat program. During this session, students received a detailed presentation about the Midway Project, solidifying their ongoing interest and



Looking ahead, our next course of action involves a thorough review of the survey responses, with a high likelihood of implementing camera surveys to track cats in the area. We've also reached out to NRE (Department of Natural Resources and Environment) for specialized training sessions, essential in preparing our committed volunteers for forthcoming camera trapping surveys around the lagoon. This collaborative effort underscores our shared commitment to responsible cat ownership and effective cat management in Midway Point.














Ten Lives Ten Day Catwalk Challenge

On October 1st, we launched our annual Ten Lives Ten Day Catwalk Challenge with a goal of raising \$10,000 in just ten days. This initiative helps cover emergency vet expenses for our foster cats, especially as we gear up for the forthcoming kitten season.

"Every kitten season, we need to allocate over \$10,000 for emergency after hours vet services," CEO Noel Hunt said. "This is in addition to managing our own Vet Surgery during regular hours, where we offer over 10,000 treatments annually for the numerous lost and abandoned cats and kittens."

This year, we managed to raise \$8,270 through the Challenge, narrowly missing our goal. A big shoutout to our Catwalkers who produced amazing social media content! A heartfelt thank you to everyone who participated and to those who generously donated in support!
