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After a long journey, we're pleased to let you know that we finally have the key to our new space! We're already starting to make use of this much-anticipated area, and it's a huge benefit for our cats.

It has been a long haul. COVID related setbacks, and the unique challenge of building on the former Hobart landfill site. But that's all behind us now, and we're looking ahead with excitement.

Over winter, this new area will be transformed into our dedicated adoption space for both adult cats and kittens, just in time for kitten season later this year.

In the meantime, Happy Paws Happy Hearts have moved into the space, along with the "Department of Joel". This move frees up part of the original building and introduces a new area that will be used for hospital space and operational improvements.

This expansion also enables us to reconfigure our existing layout to better meet the needs of our cats — including creating a dedicated area for long-term hospital care. This will make a significant difference to the recovery and wellbeing of the cats in our care.



Tradies for Tabbies

While the main build has been underway, our Tradies for Tabbies project has also seen incredible progress, thanks to the generosity of our local tradespeople and businesses.

We now have a professional vet consultation room, a new reception area, and fantastic storage facilities. We've also added a purpose-built room for our new xray machine, including dental xray capabilities.

These upgrades mean:

- Faster, more efficient care for our cats
- Improved capacity for dental procedures

- On-site xrays as we no longer need to outsource this service
- Compliance with Vet Board requirements, allowing us to carry out external community work

This opens the door to more community-based initiatives, such as our recent no cost desexing project at Midway Point/Orielton Lagoon, providing vital support for those needing a helping hand.

When Ewok arrived at Ten Lives with her sister Yoda, she was one of over thirty cats brought in from a hoarding situation.

The circumstances were deeply concerning — many of the cats were in poor health, showing signs of untreated illnesses and malnourishment. It was a tough scene that left a mark on even the most seasoned members of our team.

Both kittens were placed into foster care together, with the hope they'd recover in a safe, stable environment.

Ewok adapted quickly. She was playful, affectionate, and curious from the start.

Yoda, unfortunately, didn't fare as well.

Despite all efforts — proper vet care, close monitoring, and a lot of attention — Yoda's condition went downhill. She lost weight and stopped responding to treatment.

After a full veterinary assessment, the hard call was made to euthanise her to prevent further suffering. It wasn't the outcome anyone wanted, and her loss was felt across the team.

Meanwhile, Ewok pressed on. Her recovery had its ups and downs.

She arrived in January with a heart murmur and a painful ulcer

on her tongue, which required monitoring, medication, and eventually surgery. Even after that, the lesion took time to heal and required additional reviews under anaesthesia.

She also needed a second procedure to remove baby teeth that hadn't fallen out properly and were causing her discomfort.

At one point, she had mild sneezing and oral irritation that needed close observation. These complications meant her stay in care stretched out over several months, with regular vet checks, medication, and tailored nutrition plans.

But Ewok handled it all.

She spent her time in foster care playing, exploring, and curling up for naps. She was confident and social — good with other cats, dogs, and people.

Her personality stood out: friendly, cheeky, and full of energy. Even when she played a bit rough, she was responsive to gentle guidance, especially from her foster carers and other animals.

Her story highlights the reality behind large-scale intakes.

Cases like this are draining emotionally, physically, and financially. For the Ten Lives team - vets, foster carers, volunteers, and staff — these are part of the

job and they happen more often than people realise.

Hoarding situations demand fast action, ongoing treatment, and a lot of emotional resilience.

And sometimes, despite everyone's best efforts, we lose some along the way. That's the hard truth.

But cats like Ewok are also the reason we keep going.

She's a clear example of what proper care, time, and commitment can do. Every health check she passed was a small win.

By the end of April, nearly five

months after arriving, she was cleared for adoption.

Now, she's in a home of her own — healthy, happy, and living the life every cat deserves.

Her story isn't sugar-coated, but it's real.

And in this work, real wins like Ewok's are what matter. They remind us why we do what we do and why we'll always be ready for the next challenge.

A Path to Forever Begins in Foster

When tiny Squishy arrived at Ten Lives on March 12th, she was just a timid kitten facing an uncertain future. Found alone and in need of care, Squishy was placed in foster care to help her build confidence, learn to socialise, and grow big enough for desexing. To ease her journey, she was paired with another solitary kitten, giving both a chance to

thrive through companionship.

Though initially wary, Squishy gradually came out of her shell. With time and patience, she transformed into a sweet and affectionate companion, though she still greets new faces with a bit of caution.

Her transformation was thanks to the





dedicated care of foster carer Wren, who has been part of the Ten Lives foster team for five months. Squishy is her fourth foster kitten in that time.

"I started fostering because I saw a big need for it." Wren shares. As both a veterinary nurse and animal attendant at Ten Lives, Wren brings experience and compassion to each case she takes on

Fostering also gave Wren the chance to help out with the harder cases such as neonates, flu, ringworm or behavioural issues. "I currently have two kittens in foster - one that has giardia causing diarrhea, and one with flu and eye issues."

For those considering fostering, Wren offers a piece of advice: "Having a quiet room or designated space can be incredibly helpful for a kitten's recovery. It allows them to recuperate and feel secure."

After more than two months in care, Squishy was finally ready for adoption and moved into the adoption rooms on May 21st, taking the last step on her journey to a forever home.

Fostering is ideal for those who may not be able to make a long-term commitment to pet ownership but still want to make a difference. Whether you're studying, working remotely, or traveling between commitments, fostering offers a flexible, impactful way to help.

Ten Lives ensures every foster carer is supported with food, litter, veterinary care, and advice. But be warned—those big eyes and loving purrs might just capture your heart and turn into a proud "foster fail"!

Fostering may be temporary, but its impact is lasting. For kittens like Squishy, it can mean the difference between fear and flourishing.

Taking Cat Welfare to the Community

Alyssa Davies, Southern Region Cat Management Coordinator, and Anna Viney, Community and Education Officer, have been hard at work across the region promoting responsible cat ownership and rolling out initiatives that support cats, the environment, and the broader community.

It's been a full few months for the Ten Lives team, with a strong focus on working alongside councils, schools, and residents to make a real difference on the ground.

Anna Viney has been delivering the Edu.Cat program across local schools, helping young people understand what it means to be a responsible cat owner. With the recent upgrade to Ten Lives' facilities, Ten Lives is now better equipped to host school and group visits, providing a valuable opportunity for hands on learning in our cat shelter environment. These visits will play an important role in strengthening community awareness and

education into the future.

The Ten Lives team recently hosted representatives from Clarence and Glenorchy City Councils at their Selfs Point Road facility. Led by Alyssa Davies and Operations Manager Carolyn Dunnewijk, the visits offered an insight into the range of work Ten Lives is doing and sparked productive conversations about improving collaboration and efficiency in dealing with unwanted and stray cats. Feedback from council staff was overwhelmingly positive, with many impressed by the scale and professionalism of the operations.

Work with Tasman Council has also progressed, with a recent survey helping to highlight local issues and trends around cat ownership. Additional discussions are underway with Brighton, Sorell, Kingborough, and Derwent Valley councils as Ten Lives continues to build practical, long-term partnerships for effective cat management.



A strong existing relationship with Kingborough Council has also continued to yield positive outcomes, particularly in environmentally sensitive areas. A new brochure developed through this partnership helps educate the public on how to keep both cats and wildlife safe.

Ten Lives has recently trialled Community Surrender Days. Pop-up events designed to make it easier for people to responsibly surrender cats or kittens. For some, transport or mobility limitations can make getting to the New Town shelter difficult, while others may feel overwhelmed by the process.

By offering surrender services in local neighbourhoods, Ten Lives is removing those barriers and giving people a straightforward, supportive option. There are no fees involved, and the team is there to guide each person through the process. Whether it's an unexpected litter or a stray that's made itself at home, these events offer practical help. The hope is to continue and expand these days based on community response.

As the cost of living rises, more pet owners are facing difficult choices. In response, Ten Lives introduced Meow Meals, a food assistance program aimed at helping people keep their cats even in tough times.

The premise is simple: provide free cat food to those experiencing financial hardship, so they aren't forced to give up a pet they love. Since it launched, Meow Meals has provided over 24,000 meals to local cats.

"No one should have to give up a beloved pet because they can't afford food," says Operations Manager Carolyn Dunnewijk, who developed the initiative. "With Meow Meals, we're keeping cats where they belong; in loving homes."

The program has also become a useful way for Ten Lives team members, including the Cat Management Coordinator, to connect with the community and have open conversations about broader cat welfare issues.

Whether it's through education, council collaboration, or practical support for cat owners, Ten Lives remains committed to practical solutions that protect cats, environment and our communities.

Roger, a beautiful 4-year-old grey tabby boy, arrived at Ten Lives on 14 October 2024. It quickly became clear that Roger's path would not be an easy one. He was diagnosed with severe dental disease, including retained roots and missing teeth, as well as a condition known as luxating patellas in both of his hind legs.

Luxating patellas, a painful condition where the kneecap slips out of its normal position, left Roger unable to run or jump freely.

To give Roger the best chance at a happy and pain-free life, he required extensive dental surgery and was initially assessed as potentially needing surgery on his legs to correct the luxation.

However, despite the challenges, Roger's loving and affectionate personality shone through. He was described by his foster carer as quiet and independent, with a strong preference for receiving chin scratches and belly rubs. Roger was not one for being picked up but would sit next to his

foster carer or hop onto their lap when he chose to. He was very vocal at mealtimes, a sign of his good appetite, and loved to sleep at the end of the bed. Playtime was another of his joys, especially pouncing on feather wands and batting at small toys.

In foster care, Roger's needs were met with patience and love. After undergoing dental surgery and recovering well, his luxating patellas remained asymptomatic, meaning he did not show signs of pain or lameness. The dental surgery had removed several teeth, and Roger was placed on a special wet food diet to maintain his health. His condition was closely monitored and, although his luxating patellas had not caused him any issues, regular veterinary checks were advised to help prevent potential arthritis.

Roger's road to recovery was not without its hurdles. Early on, it became evident that Ten Lives needed better access to radiology services to provide the best care for cats like Roger. His dental issues and patella luxation required radiographs, but with no radiology facilities on site, Roger had to travel for his scans. For a cat already under stress in a new environment, the experience was less than ideal.

It was then that Ten Lives launched a crowdfunding campaign to raise funds for essential radiology equipment, including an x-ray machine, to help cats like Roger receive faster, more efficient and less stressful care.

The community's support was overwhelming. With a goal of raising \$15,000, Ten Lives surpassed that target, raising \$19,610. This incredible generosity meant new radiology equipment could be purchased, and a dedicated x-ray room set up at the Centre. The equipment will not only benefit Roger but will allow Ten Lives to treat all cats in

need with greater ease, efficiency and care. Having the ability to perform radiographs on site will reduce stress for the cats, save valuable time, and help provide better diagnoses and treatment plans.

Roger's story came full circle when he was adopted on 19
December 2024. His loving nature, quiet independence, and playful spirit made him a perfect companion for his new family.
Roger now has the chance to live a pain-free life, running and jumping in a home that truly understands and appreciates him.

Roger's story is a testament to the power of community support, and how it can change the lives of cats like him. With the new radiology equipment in place, Ten Lives is now better equipped than ever to provide essential treatment to all the cats in their care.

We encourage everyone to follow the Trail, explore local op shops, and experience the joy of shopping with purpose.



Happy Paws Happy Hearts and Ten Lives Creating Connections for Hearts and Paws

This year marks a decade of Happy Paws Happy Hearts (HPHH) creating positive change for socially isolated Australians and rescue animals in need.

As part of their 10-year milestone, they are celebrating their incredible partnership with Ten Lives Cat Centre in Hobart—where together, they are forging paws-itively life-changing connections between people and rescue cats.

Since launching in Hobart in January 2023, the HPHH program at Ten Lives has welcomed participants into a nurturing space where they can build confidence, develop social skills, and gain independence through hands-on animal interactions. At the same time, the rescue cats and kittens receive valuable care and socialisation, helping them along their journey to finding loving 'fur-ever' homes.

HPHH was founded in Queensland with the vision that people facing barriers to social inclusion could benefit from meaningful engagement with rescue animals. HPHH now operates in eight locations across Australia, including Ten Lives

in Hobart and opening earlier this year at Dogs' Homes of Tasmania, Hobart.

HPHH Program Trainer Juliana shares her firsthand experience of the program's impact.

"Every day is different-there's always a new fluffy friend seeking love and care, and our participants' enthusiasm is contagious! They soak up everything they learn through the bonds they form with the shelter cats, always demonstrating kindness and mindfulness in their interactions."

Juliana also shared a special moment, unofficially dubbing the day 'Friendship Friday':

"I looked at our volunteer, Ros, as the group enjoyed an activity together and we both said, 'wow.' Before our eyes, we were witnessing everything our programs are about—connection, friendship, and support. In just a short time, participants had built social skills, taken turns in activities, and supported each other. They now all call each other good friends."

HPHH programs at Ten Lives incorporate animal behaviour. training, and enrichment to facilitate psychosocial growth and wellbeing. One participant shared. "Seeing the cats, kittens, and trainers makes my day. It's nice to talk to people. I like coming here because otherwise, I would just be stuck at home."

The program's impact extends beyond the shelter. In 2024, participants contributed to 'Meow Meals,' a Ten Lives initiative preparing nutritious food packs for families in need. As they celebrate a decade of impact. HPHH is proud to continue growing their partnership with Ten Lives, together, making a difference—one paw at a time.

At Ten Lives Cat Centre, where so many cats are given the chance to start fresh in loving homes, Blaze's story stands out as a testament to perseverance and the power of teamwork.

Blaze, a spirited ginger male estimated at just one year old, embarked on a tumultuous journey through foster care, adoption rooms, and back, all while battling health setbacks that tested his newfound stability.

Blaze's time at Ten Lives began with a routine examination that found him in generally good health, aside from a mild build-up of dental tartar – nothing out of the ordinary for a young cat. It didn't take long for his affectionate and curious nature to win over the staff and volunteers, who eagerly followed his progress towards adoption.

However, Blaze's path was not without its hurdles. Shortly after initial health checks, blood in his stool raised concerns, prompting intensive monitoring and dietary adjustments.

Despite these setbacks, Blaze's determination shone through as he adapted to new diets and environments under the careful watch of Ten Lives' dedicated team.

"We wanted Blaze to thrive," recalls one of the veterinary nurses who cared for him. "He was shy at first, but once settled, he was a dream – gentle, fond of gazing out the window, and a connoisseur of head scratches."

The team's efforts intensified as Blaze underwent multiple veterinary visits and dietary trials to pinpoint the cause of his health challenges. Each setback was met with meticulous care, from specialised diets to careful examinations and close observation, ensuring no stone was left unturned in his diagnosis and recovery.

Blaze's journey highlighted the importance of persistence and collaboration. From the

veterinary staff to the devoted foster carers and volunteers, every individual played a crucial role in his recovery.

Amid these challenges, Blaze's playful spirit never waned. His love for small squishy toys and fluffy blankets endeared him to everyone who crossed his path. As weeks turned into months, Blaze's health stabilised, thanks to a tailored diet and compassionate care that became his new norm.

Finally, on 29th March, after 52 days in care, Blaze was adopted into a loving home – completing his transformation from stray to cherished companion.

If your cat was adopted from Ten Lives since April 2017 through to the end of 2024, here's an important reminder that could make all the difference if they ever go missing.

Many of these cats were registered with HomeSafeID, a microchip registry that is now facing uncertainty. The company is currently uncontactable, and while their database remains available for the time being, there's no guarantee it will stay that way.

This means your cat's microchip might not lead back to you in the future unless you take a few simple steps now.

Why This Matters

Microchipping is one of the best ways to bring lost pets home. But if the registry holding your contact details goes offline, the microchip won't help. That's why it's important to check and, if necessary, re-register your pet's details with another provider.

What You Can Do

1. Find your cat's microchip number

It's on your adoption paperwork. If you can't find it, reach out to Ten Lives.

2. Check your pet's current registry

TenLives

Go to <u>petaddress.com.au</u> and enter the microchip number. If it shows **HomeSafeID**, it's time to update.

3. Choose a new registry

Make sure to include any required documentation and note that your cat was adopted from Ten Lives when applying.

Tony's Running Challenge


We're thrilled to share that Tony Ross-McNair recently raised \$1,136 for Ten Lives through an extraordinary running effort!

A heartfelt thank you goes out to Tony and everyone who donated. Your support is making a real and lasting difference in the lives of the animals Ten Lives cares for.








MICHAEL & HELEN
